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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

- Dakshin Kamrup College, established in the year 1961 is a pioneering centre of higher education and is situated in Mirza under Palasbari Revenue Circle in Kamrup district of Assam. The college is about 7 km away from the Lokopriya Gopinath Bordoloi International Airport and 15 kms from Gauhati University to the west.
- In the year 1972 the college shifted from its old premises to the present location and has been pursuing a steady course towards expanding its academic and infrastructural needs. The Science stream started in 1979 was brought under the deficit Grants-in-aid system in 1987. The College was affiliated to Section 2(f) and 12(B) certification of the UGC Act, 1956 on 19/02/1971. It was provincialised in 2006 under the Assam Provincialised College Management Rule, 2006 by the Government of Assam.
- The college, affiliated to the Gauhati University is a co educational Degree institution having four streams. Besides these streams PG classes in Assamese and Zoology was started in the year 2013 and 2017 respectively. The college started Commerce Stream at degree level from August 2017. Bachelor of Vocation stream was started in 2015. PGDCA course was introduced in 2005.
- The college is AISHE certified and is also carrying out extension activities under Unnat Bharat Abhiyan 2.
- The college has a well stocked library with a computerised section.
- The college at present has two hostels- one for Women and one for Boys with a seat capacity of 80 and 50 seats respectively. The plan for renovating the Boys' Hostel has been submitted to the Govt. of Assam.
- The college has a Study Centre of Krishna Kanta Handiqui State Open University (KKHSOU) catering to the needs of the locality by offering various UG and PG programs.
- The college in order to encourage the spirit of sports amongst its students has its own Indoor Stadium, the Basket Ball and Volley Ball courts of the college. It has a spacious playground in the other campus.
- The college has its own Health Centre with a full time Nurse.

Vision

- The vision of the college centres on its strong wish to become a centre of excellence in the academic field of the entire North Eastern Region.
- It envisions being at par with the national standard in the field of education.
- Apart from education it wants the young generation to reconstruct a society based on dignity of labour, moral and spiritual values.
- The institute aims to impart futuristic education and instil high standards of discipline through its dedicated faculty.

Mission

- The college pursues a noble mission of spreading the light of knowledge as is evident from the Upanisadic hymn "Tamaso Ma Jyotirgamaya" engraved in the College emblem.
- It wants the students to learn that it is not scientific progress alone, but the synthesis of both scientific

progress and spiritual power of man that could open out vistas of human endeavour and achievement, paving the way for a better world to live in.

- To construct an inclusive learning environment that blends education and emerging technology.
- Imparting knowledge of the state-of-the-art technological advancements that enables our students to compete with the advanced students of the country.
- To imbibe a culture amongst the graduating students that inspires the practice of giving back to the society.
- To impart value-based education that builds resilience, sensitivity, critical thinking through a conducive teaching learning environment.

To make the students robust in natural sciences, social sciences and humanities, ethics, commerce and vocational studies, the college aims at setting up a national standard.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

The strength of the college may be mentioned in terms of (i) Physical properties, (ii) Material properties and (iii) Human properties.

- Girls' Common Room (g+1) with a vending machine and an incinerator machine.
- Library and Computer Science Building consisting of central library with a computerised section, reading rooms, librarian's office, Computer Science department with classrooms and lab.
- Sudhakantha Bhupen Hazarika Auditorium and Alumni Office with PG classrooms.
- Women's Hostel with the Hostel warden's quarters.
- Boys' Hostel.
- 3 numbers of ATMs for the college faculty members, staff, students and the public at large.
- Solar panels with installed capacity of 21.0 kW
- Fire extinguishers.
- Vermicomposting unit.
- Green house.
- 40 numbers of CCTVs are installed in the campus to monitor and record the movements of the students and others.
- 3 deep tube wells.

(iii) Human Property

- Visionary Governing Body leading the institution in achieving its goal of becoming a centre of excellence in the entire North Eastern Region.
- Dedicated staff and experienced faculty committed to work for the all-round development of the institution.

Institutional Weakness

- No faculty and supporting staff in sanctioned posts to run Environmental Studies, PGDCA, Commerce and Vocational studies streams is the major weakness of the institution. Although as per the previous NAAC peer team recommendation, new subjects like Sociology, Psychology, Instrumentation Science, Mass Communication, Biotechnology was introduced no post has been sanctioned by the Government of Assam till date. Moreover, there is insufficient number of government sanctioned posts in some departments.
- The college waits the sanctioning of new teaching posts by the government for the opening of post graduate courses in various departments.
- The office of the college has also insufficient staff in government sanctioned posts.
- Lack of regular flow of funds slow down the proper maintenance of various equipment for which the functioning of the institutional level biotech hub has been slowed down.
- Dearth of a fully furnished college auditorium is another weakness of the college as the Sudhakantha

Bhupen Hazarika Auditorium constructed with RUSA funding is awaiting completion.

- Lack of a well-equipped gymnasium and a fully furnished indoor sports complex is another weakness of the college.
- Boys' Hostel which is waiting fund sanctioning from the state government for reconstruction.
- Lack of a Yoga Centre and Coaching Classes.

Institutional Opportunity

- Opportunity to develop Pisciculture through integrated fishery management for resource generation from the existing pond situated in the Boys' Hostel campus.
- To prepare the students and the local youth for the job market by offering more skill-based courses as the neighbouring areas has some tourist spots and industries.
- Opportunity to set up a training centre for handicrafts and handlooms as the area is well known for Eri silk cottage industry.
- To work for expanding e-learning.
- To set up a Research Cell to promote all types of research activities among faculty members and students.
- To promote research on indigenous art, craft, language, heritage, folk culture etc. in order to build a pool of assets for the society as well as to create batches of young people who are responsible, employable and proud of their roots.
- The playground can be developed into a mini stadium for promotion of rural sports.

Institutional Challenge

- Shortage of sufficient funds and late release of the allotted fund for free admission by the State government is the major challenge that the college has to face while preparing budget allocation for academic and other developmental activities.
- Lack of limited research infrastructure hampers social contribution.
- Meritorious students of the locality even after enrolling themselves in the college prefer to get admitted in city colleges since Mirza is very nearer to Guwahati city.
- Training the teaching and non-teaching staff to be technologically efficient proves to be a major challenge.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Dakshin Kamrup College offers UG, PG, Vocational Studies and PGDCA programs as per the recommended curriculum of Gauhati University. The institutional Academic Calendar prepared in accordance to the Academic Calendar of the affiliating university, under the supervision of the IQAC is available in the institutional website. The institution adheres to it for the conduct of continuous Internal Assessment. The tentative dates for holding Internal/Sessional examinations are notified in the calendar. Moreover, the institution has a well-planned Prospectus and RTI document (available in the institutional website) for the convenience and proper dissemination of necessary information. The general class routine prepared by the institutional Routine Committee reflects the proper planning of the institution with regards to curriculum

delivery. The institution follows the examination and evaluation pattern of the parent university. The Internal Examination Committee of the institution holds the examinations on time. The Head of the Departments keeps records of the marksheets of the students. Departmental Parent Teacher Meets are organised to keep the parents informed about the performance of the students. The college has so far carried out one certificate course successfully.

The institution integrates cross cutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability prescribed in the curriculum through the amalgamation of theory and practice. Seminars, street plays, awareness programs and extension activities along with the Code of Conduct Handbook and committees set up for maintaining discipline and to prevent ragging contributes in moulding good human beings.

The annual feedbacks on curricular and other aspects collected by the institution from its stake holders are compiled into reports which are available in the institutional website. The feedback thus collected are analysed at the departmental level and the action taken reports are submitted to the head of the institution for further improvement.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The enrolment percentage of the institution against sanctioned seats is very high. The institution follows the government reservation policy in regard to allotment of seats reserved for various categories.

Teaching learning is imparted to the students by using both the traditional lecture method/chalk and talk method and through the use of ICT tools. During the Pandemic teaching learning was conducted mostly in the online mode using various platforms, experimental learning is basically imparted in the science laboratories and experiential and participative learning is imparted through field survey, project work, group discussion, workshops, seminars etc. conducted from time to time.

A total of 94 numbers of full-time teachers engaged in teaching learning process are equally engaged in evaluation process of the students. The students are evaluated internally from time to time through the Sessional Examinations, class seminars, class and home assignments, laboratory experiments, field reports or project reports etc. Students' performance is well monitored by the concerned departments and necessary counselling is provided to rectify their mistakes and omissions. The institution maintains transparency in the process of internal examinations and related grievances.

The students are made aware of the programme and course outcomes by the faculty members of the respective departments in the beginning of each new session both in the classrooms and through Orientation Programmes organised centrally by the IQAC.

The pass percentage of the institution in all the four streams is 83.58, which is quite high. The institution also conducts Students Satisfaction Survey annually, the reports of which are available in the institutional website.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Dakshin Kamrup College has taken baby steps in the field of resource mobilisation for research. So far, the college has set up a minor research cell which is funded by one of the senior faculty members of the college to

encourage the teaching staff to carry out research work on the issues related to the adjacent areas of the college. During the last five years a few research projects funded by central agencies like DBT, SERB and MHRD, Govt. of India were carried out by the faculty members of the college. Individual faculty members have also taken up research work during this period leading to PhD degrees. The Advanced level Institutional Biotech Hub which was functional till 2019 as per the govt. rules also played its role in developing scientific temper and encourages faculties and students to take up research work. However, a number of research papers are published by the faculty members in UGC care listed and other reputed journals besides books and book chapters.

The college has successfully carried out a number of out-reach programmes on educational and research tool and extension activities on Swachh Bharat, gender issues, saving habits of people, training programme on utilisation of agro waste for mushroom cultivation and spawn supply for women Self- help groups, sensitisation programme on COVID 19 awareness and it's precautions in the adopted villages, nearby schools and in the adjacent areas through its NSS unit, NCC Air Wing, Women's Forum and various academic departments. The college has been able to sensitize the students to social issues through such activities and thereby contribute to their holistic development.

The college has a sizeable number of MoUs for helping in academic activities of the college. Student exchange programme and teacher exchange programmes have been carried out under such MoU so far.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching learning programmes with an area of 6.61 acre in the college campus. In addition to this there is 8.60 acre land in the Boys' Hostel campus. The college campus is under CCTV surveillance with separate blocks for the administration and college canteen, science, arts and commerce departments, central library and computer science, sports complex, health centre, college auditorium, ATMs and various office rooms for KKH State Open University Study Centre, NSS, NCC etc. The college library with a computerised section has OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue) and NLIST facility for users.

Some of the classrooms have provision for IT facilities like LCD projectors, smart boards, digital room and computer laboratories. A public address system is also installed to support the dissemination of information amongst the students and employees through in campus announcements. The student computer ratio is 28:1. Internet and free Wi-Fi is available in specific areas within the campus.

Student Support and Progression

Students enrolled in the college are benefitted by Government scholarship and some departments are offering one-time financial aid in the form of study materials and cash to meritorious students belonging to BPL category.

For capacity building and skill enhancement, the college has taken a number of initiatives by organising workshops for soft skills, seminars and webinars for language and communication skills, training camps like yoga, various sports activities for maintaining physical fitness. A few health check-up camps are also organised to create awareness about health and hygiene amongst the college fraternity.

The college has also organised some programmes to guide the students for planning and securing their future for employability in the job market. So far, an in-campus placement drive was also conducted by the Career and Counselling Cell.

The college is well determined to prohibit ragging, sexual harassment etc. as per the government directives. Statutory bodies like Anti-ragging committee, Disciplinary committee, Internal Committee(IC) etc. are set up by the college for timely redressal of grievances of student and staff. The students and the staff are made aware of sexual harassment through display boards in the campus and awareness programs conducted by the IC. Signboards displaying rules pertaining to ragging are put up in prominent places within the campus to create awareness amongst the students. Moreover, the college website also provides information about the policies of the college and Government directives regarding ragging and sexual harassment for dissemination of information. The college has initiated mechanisms for submitting both online and offline facilities and timely redress such grievances if any.

The percentage of students' progression to higher education and placement is quite impressive. The students have also shown 100 percent success rate in state/national level examinations during the last five years. In the field of sports and cultural activities, the students were able to collect awards in the university/state/national and international levels in the individual categories.

The alumni of the college have also donated generously for the benefit of the college.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The institution follows a democratic and participatory mode of governance involving all the stakeholders to participate actively in its administration. The organogram, uploaded in the college website is the mirror to decentralisation and participation in the institutional governance.

The various cells of the college work for the overall development of the students.

The college has successfully installed a computerised section in the college library. College office is partially digitised with online administration, student admission, finance and accounts.

The college has a well-planned and effective welfare measures for both the teaching and non-teaching staff. The college also provides one-time financial aid to members suffering from long term illness or with high medical expenditure. Financial aid is also provided from the college as retirement benefits in the form of cash.

The active faculty members of the college have participated in FDPs from time to time for career enhancements.

The college has an appropriate framework for effective utilisation and management of funds received from sources like RUSA, DST, DBT, Assam Government, UGC etc. The college has set up a mechanism for financial contribution from alumni, memorial prizes and endowments from other stakeholders. The policies for of the college for fund mobilisation are used to maintain a sustainable campus with emphasis on green campus. Various internal committees are also set up for allocation of fund to different departments and centres. The college encourages its faculty members to participate in programmes in different capacities for intellectual mobilisation.

The IQAC has successfully introduced mentoring classes to the students' benefit. Different seminars and workshops organised by the IQAC has encouraged the students to develop their entrepreneurship skills. Under the aegis of the IQAC a Micro Research Cell has been set up to encourage research activities. The IQAC has taken initiative to familiarize the faculty and staff of the college for the NEP 2020 by organising lecture programmes by eminent experts from different universities. It has introduced the students to the various societal issues and showed them the ways to solve them. It has always encouraged the college to carry out internal audits through certified Chartered Accountant.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The college takes initiatives to popularise the concept of gender equity by organising various programmes and by conducting internal Annual Gender Audits. Moreover, the college also taken initiatives to celebrate and organise national and international commemorative days, events and festivals during the last five years by organising a number of programmes, academic and extra-curricular activities.

Alternate sources of energy in the form of solar panels are set up by the college to meets the energy consumption demands partially. The college campus is disable friendly and barrier free. Separate parking space is also allotted for the disabled. Green Audits, Environment audits, Energy Audits are conducted internally annually and through external agencies like IIT, Guwahati. The college has taken proper initiatives for waste disposal. The college authority and the volunteers of the NSS unit of the college have always taken initiatives to maintain a clean and green campus. The college provides an inclusive environment and tries to sensitise students and employees to the constitutional obligations in order to build responsible citizens.

The college has a number of meritorious students coming from economically weaker sections of the locality. In order to encourage them the college has successfully implemented the Student Support System by awarding cash prizes from donor members. A number of students have been benefited through such best practises of the college. For the smooth functioning of the college office automation has been done partially which served in maintaining financial transparency and is time saving.

1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

Dakshin Kamrup College, affiliated to Gauhati University offering Under Graduate and Post Graduate programmes follows the recommended curriculum for affiliating colleges. Curriculum planning and syllabi designing does not fall under the purview of the institution. The institution at the recommendation of the parent university started implementing CBCS programmes from 2019 onwards and the non CBCS programmes ended in the 2020-2021 academic year.

For the effective curriculum delivery the institution organized an inter-active session with one of the experts of the CBCS curriculum designing committee of Gauhati University to orient the faculty members and the office staff about the teaching and evaluation process under the CBCS curriculum before the actual commencement of the programmes. A number of our faculty members are involved in preparing textbooks as per the recommendations of CBCS syllabus.

The NEP (National Education Policy) is yet to be implemented by Gauhati University, still the Department of Education along with IQAC organized a talk on “Implementation of NEP 2020 – Its Problems and Prospects” to aware the faculty and students about NEP.

An academic calendar is prepared by the institution under the supervision of IQAC is available in the institutional website and the institution adheres to it for the conduct of continuous Internal Assessment. This is prepared following the Gauhati University’s (affiliating University) academic calendar after its publication. The tentative dates for holding Internal/Sessional examinations are notified in academic calendar. Moreover, the institution has a well planned Prospectus and a RTI document (available in the institutional website) for the convenience and proper dissemination of necessary information. The general class routine of the institution reflects the proper planning of the institution with regards to curriculum delivery through normal and practical classes, mentoring and remedial classes. Recommended field study and project works incorporated in the curriculum are conducted by the concerned departments. The institution encourages the departments to hold departmental talks, seminars and workshops for effective curriculum delivery.

The institution follows the examination and evaluation pattern of the parent university. All sessional exams are conducted according to the marks allotted by the parent university. The students are given the scheduled examination timetables well in advance by the Internal Examination Committee (IEC) formed by the Principal on rotation basis after consultation with senior faculty members and the office Sectional Assistant. The IEC frames guidelines for conducting internal assessments according to the parent university and institution’s academic calendar. The committee schedules internal/sessional examination, seating arrangements, invigilators duty list for every exam. They prepare and scrutinize question papers for the exam in the prescribed pattern covering the syllabus by the concerned HODs. They distribute the answer scripts along with blank mark sheets for evaluation by faculty members which are to be submitted

in the stipulated time. The marks are communicated to the students by the concerned departments.

Some of the departments organize Parent Teacher Meets to keep abreast the parents about the progress of their respective wards. Moreover, departmental efforts are made to keep continuously assessing its students through class and home assignments, both in online and offline modes.

Response:

The institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability in different ways. Teaching in environment and sustainability is already included in the UG curriculum of the affiliating university. Some of the courses under UG programmes have specific chapters that contain professional ethics, gender sensitization and human values etc. Moreover, the institution organises workshops, seminars and street plays regarding these aspects from time to time.

Professional ethics: In some of the UG programmes topics related to professional ethics are included to prepare the students for their bright future.

Gender: Gender Sensitivity and gender sensitization is accomplished through amalgamation of theory and practice. Gender related topics are included in the various UG and PG courses. The IQAC has always played a positive role in gender sensitization. It has collaborated with the English Study Forum of the Department of English in this regard and organised various programmes like, a one day seminar on “Projection of Women in 21st Century English Literature and Indian Theatre (05/03/2021), On the Spot Slogan Writing Competition on “Gender Equality & Stop Sexual Harassment” (10/03/2021) and a street play by the Honours students of the department entitled “Dekhio NedeKha” i.e., “To overlook” highlighting eve teasing, acid attack, abortion and domestic violence. The IQAC and the Women’s Forum organized the following programmes: Gender Awareness Cum Distribution of Sanitary Napkins in the adopted village of Ganeshpara (09/02/2022), celebration of International Womens’ Day with a street play on the theme ‘Gender Equality Today for a Sustainable Tomorrow’ (08/03/2022). The IQAC along with the Department of Sociology organized an Awareness Programme on Beti Bachoa Beti Padhoa in a nearby village Sontala (25/02/22).

Human values: Code of Conduct Handbook, Anti Ragging Committee and Disciplinary Committee of the institution along with the topics on human values included in the UG courses contributed towards molding good human beings.

Environment and sustainability: A compulsory paper on Environmental Studies, included in the UG courses gives a fair exposure to the students about the importance of environment and its sustainability.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences using ICT tools

Response:

College has made a good effort to make its students digitally literate with expertise in using ICT tools. At least 60 percent of the total course are achieved by traditional lecture method/Chalk and talk method. Experimental learning is practised in science laboratories through practical classes. Computer assisted learning is mostly in the use of Computer Science department, although other Departments too use computer aided tools for teaching learning transaction. Almost all the departments are well acquainted with project work, field survey, group discussion and weekend seminars. The college facilitates a well-equipped digital class room. Nine nos. rooms are equipped with LCD projector, lecture podium and collar microphone to present seminar, group discussion etc. Students are benefitted with study materials in digital form through the departmentally installed computers and internet facilities. The college has been entertaining free WiFi facility for the students within the periphery of the campus.

The Mass Communication department is well infrastructured with various ICT facilities. It is facilitated with a recording studio, movie camera, video camera, DSL camera, head phone along with six numbers of working computers. Field trips to radio stations is arranged departmentally to train up the students for the practical use of these ICT tools. Field work/project work is a part of curriculum almost of all departments. Surveying, data collection, specimen collection, data analysis and report writing are some of the modes of experiential learning. The college facilitates a digital Xerox machine in the library and office to make student access for reproduction of reading materials or office documents. The library has a computerised section and the office is partially automated. Since Covid 19 pandemic period both teachers and students are familiar with online class, webinar and online OTB examination. Whatsapp is very popularly used for exchange views relating to academic and other purpose. Students are now well accustomed with online form fill up, admission and digital monetary transaction.

The college organizes different competitive events of sports, culture and literature annually wherefrom excellence of concerned fields are encouraged to accelerate their skill like interactive learning, collaborative and independent learning and help them to earn an occupation of such expertise. Election of students' union for legitimate activities, participation in youth festivals and different competitive programmes outside the campus, membership of NSS, NCC etc are some of the participative mode of learning which have the plausible opportunities to establish the students in different avenues with acquisition of life skill, knowledge management and lifelong earnings.

The college has taken the initiative of setting up a 'Language Lab' as per the previous NAAC recommendation. The fund for the same has been generated from alumni donations.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

Internal evaluations like periodical class tests, home assignment, laboratory experiment, field reporting or project reporting are recommended by the respective departments. Instead of strictures, students are amicably advised and encouraged to take part in such evaluations. Students' performance, especially, in the honours subjects are well monitored by individual departments and necessary counselling are provided to rectify their mistakes or omissions. But the college centrally conducts one sessional/unit tests for the UG students which is mandatory as per the Gauhati University guideline. However, for those students who are unable to pass the sessional tests, reexaminations are held to provide them with an opportunity to ace the subject. Though the institute neither can impose rigorous punishment nor can debar the students from appearing in the final examination for not attending in the sessional/unit tests, all the UG students have to appear in these tests where from a percentage of marks are carried over to the final examination in the form of Internal Assessment. Therefore the participation of students in the internal examination is almost intact and their response to the evaluation process is improved significantly. Question papers are prepared in the model format of the final examination. Marks are notified in the notice board of the individual department. There is a provision for repeat Sessional examination for those students who could not appear or failed in the first Sessional examination.

The college is very transparent to students or their guardians in case of internal or external examinations. In required circumstances, evaluated answer scripts are shown to the anxious or curious students to maintain transparency in the evaluation process which enhances their confidence upon evaluation process.

The evaluation of undergraduate programme is carried out centrally by the Gauhati University. As per the University rules an aggrieved student can apply for re-evaluation of papers after paying a nominal fee. Furthermore, the facilities of RTI Act for any information are available now.

2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1 Programme Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) for all Programmes offered by the institution are stated and displayed on website and attainment of POs and COs are evaluated

Response:

As the institution is affiliated to Gauhati University, it follows the curriculum of the parent university and offers the stated Programmes recommended by the university. Hence, the Programmes Outcomes (POs) and the Course Outcomes (COs) offered by the institution and the Programme and the Course offered by the university are the same.

The various UG and PG Programmes offered by the parent university is available in the official website of the university which can be downloaded by the affiliating colleges. The teachers of the institution are aware of the Programme and the Course Outcome of their concerned subjects as a hardcopy of the same is available in each department for ready reference. The students can avail the same or can search in the parent university website for their reference. Their confusions, if any are cleared by the faculty members. In the beginning of the new session the faculty members communicate the respective Course Outcomes to the newly admitted honours students through an Orientation Programme centrally organised by IQAC for every department. In this Orientation Programme information about the higher education options and the associated job opportunities are disseminated to the students. The Programme and Course offered by the institution are available in the college website for dissemination of information.

Although there is no provision for suggestion and recommendation to the affiliated university for the Programme and Course Outcomes, the College takes some methods to assess the attainment of Programme Outcomes and Course Outcomes. To measure the students' achievement various evaluative procedures have been adopted. Sessional examination, unit test, periodical class test, departmental assignment test, laboratory experiment, home work, project work etc are some of the formative evaluative approaches wherein students are given exercise/problems to make solution independently. In these tests their explanatory, writing capacity, creativity etc are monitored and errors committed by them are pointed out and instructed for rectification. Laboratory experiments, field reporting, project reporting etc enhance the students' creativity. Internal evaluations make students involve in identification of problems, rectification of errors and preparation for proper response for such problems. External evaluation/final examinations are however conducted by the University and students are made prepared to appear in these examinations. All the results of the external examinations conducted by the Affiliating University are considered as primary measures to assess the Programme Outcome and Course Outcome. The Programme Outcomes are measured on the basis of the marks/grades obtained by the students in the concerned external examinations. Performance of the students in End-Semester examinations are discussed and analysed by individual department.

These are evaluated through students' feedback which is uploaded in the College website. At the same time, review of curriculum and enrichment strategies is done through Departmental meetings and the meetings of the Teachers Council. IQAC supervises such feedback activities and submits summary findings. Parent- Teacher Meets are organized regularly by the college and also by the academic departments individually to review the teaching- learning and evaluation process. Informal Discussions with Parents on effectiveness of programs is also done.

- 4.The Department of Journalism and Mass Communication has initiated steps regarding student exchange with higher institute of learning, On-job training and interactive sessions for broadening their skill based knowledge.

From the purview of faculty members, the following initiatives have been taken for innovations and

knowledge creation and transfer-

1. Research Papers are being annually published in recognized Journals by Faculties of various disciplines. Thirty eight research papers have been published since 2017 till date.
2. Patent has been granted in 2018 by the Patent office of the Govt. of India to individual faculty member for PhD research work.
3. 71 Books and chapters in edited volumes have also been published in the last 5 years.
4. Research Projects awarded to faculty members have been limited. Still, faculty members have been engaged in Research Projects sanctioned by central agencies like DBT, SERB and MHRD, Govt. of India during the last five years.
5. Individual faculty members have also taken up research work during this period leading to PhD degree.
6. The Advanced level Institutional Biotech Hub has also been functional in the Institution till 2019 as per Govt. rules. It has played its part in development of scientific temper and encouraged faculties and students to take up research work through its facilities.

Although the institution has worked its way up for creating an ecosystem for innovation and has initiated knowledge creation and transfer, the challenges that have been faced in this regard are:

1. Faculty members have to attend to additional Govt. duties apart from teaching and research which make it difficult for them to focus on Research Proposals.
2. Closing of Funding from UGC for Minor Research Projects since 2017
3. Tight schedule of classes and examinations.

The Institution being a premier college in South Kamrup, is committed to its social responsibilities and has

done extension services in the neighbourhood communities for holistic development.

It conducts its extension services mainly through its NSS unit, the newly created NCC Air wing, various academic Departments as well as through the Women's Forum.

The college also has adopted villages in Ganeshpara, Monpur, Gorgora, located in the adjacent area of the college campus, where it extends social and academic services.

The extension services carried out for sensitizing students to social issues, for their holistic development include:

1. The Department of Botany conducted outreach programme on educational and research tool for Nahira Guimara High School on 2nd and 3rd July, 2018. Around 150 students from the neighbourhood school participated in the programme and were exposed to basic scientific methods and laboratory practices.
2. The Department of Botany and Biotech Hub, D.K. College, Mirza conducted Training Programme on Utilization of Agrowaste for mushroom cultivation and spawn supply for women Self Help Group on March, 2019 for skill based training and opening up avenues for self-employment.
3. The Department of Economics conducted a socio economic survey on pottery work at Rajapukhuri, Mirza on 2nd November, 2018, where 52 students participated and were sensitized regarding the social and economic status of the neighbourhood community and scope for their upliftment.
4. Special Camps are organized by NSS at adopted villages to sensitize the population about social and cleanliness issues.
5. Swachh Bharat Abhiyan and Fit India run organized by the NSS for sensitizing students and community about Cleanliness practices and the need of fitness.
6. The Department of Economics undertook a survey on saving habits of the people in the neighbouring communities. The students were sensitized about understanding the importance of savings. The importance of opening a savings account in the bank was also stressed among the masses.
7. The Dakshin Kamrup College Teachers' unit organized a sensitization programme on COVID 19 awareness and its precautions for the neighbourhood community. The masses were distributed soaps and sanitizers and were made aware of their importance during covid times.
8. The Women's Forum of the college is also actively involved in the extension activities. The celebration of International Women's Day has been marked by extension activities of the Forum. In 2018 the street vendors in the neighbourhood were distributed blankets as felicitation and encouraged to be self reliant. The Teachers and girl students of the college took part in this programme. In 2022, a street play named "Upolobdhi" (Self realization) and an awareness programme was organized at Monpur Naamghor Prangon in the vicinity of the college. The masses were made aware about the role of women in environmental issues and their legal rights for sustainable development.

4.1.1 Availability of adequate infrastructure and physical facilities viz., classrooms, laboratories, ICT facilities, cultural activities, gymnasium, yoga centre etc. in the institution

Response:

The college has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching-learning to run different programs. The built in area of the Academic and Administrative campus is 15995.67 sq. meters and the Boys' Hostel campus is 4738.05 sq. meters.

Academic and Administrative campus houses 07 R.C.C. buildings, 08 Assam Type (AT) houses, 1 Auditorium, 2 parking sheds for two and four wheelers, basket and volley ball courts, 03 busts (Gajendra Nath Thakuria, Founder Principal; B.R. Ambedkar and Dr. Indira Goswami, Sahitya Akademi and Jnanpith Awardee), All Assam Students Union plaque, National Service Scheme plaque, 03 ATMs, a transformer, 05 generators, solar panels, 36 park benches and 40 CCTVs.

Administrative block houses the College office, Canteen, Teachers' Common Room; the Principal's office, Krishna Kanta Handique Conference Hall and the Departments of Mass Communication, Environmental Science, Geography, History and the Digital Room.

Science block consists of 02 G+2 RCC buildings housing the Departments of Physics, Chemistry, Zoology, Botany, Mathematics, Education, Bio Technology and the Bio-Tech Hub. The Science building also hosts a Materials Science Laboratory in the Department of Physics, which is involved in cutting edge research.

Arts and Commerce Blocks consisting of an RCC building have the Boys' Common Room, Students Union Body Office, Gymnasium, Departments of English, Economics, Accountancy, Management, Finance, Vocational Studies, Bioinformatics Laboratory and classrooms. The Departments of Assamese, Political Science, Philosophy, Women's Forum, IQAC Office and the Academic In-charge's office, the Examination Branch, KKH Study Center, NSS, NCC office, Indoor Sports Complex, Health Center, Physics and Chemistry laboratories and classrooms are housed in several AT houses across the college campus.

Girls' Common Room is G+1 RCC building with two recreation rooms having washroom facilities and an incinerator and a vending machine.

The College Library is housed in two RCC buildings with the stack room, students reading room, teachers reading room, Reference Section, Deposit Library and Hard Bound Section. The same building also houses the Department of Computer Science.

Auditorium Complex: The 1500 seat capacity auditorium is still to be completed. It also houses 2 classrooms and the Alumni Office.

Womens' Hostel campus (G+2) RCC building with 80 seat capacities has CCTVs, boundary wall, kitchen, dining hall, incinerator, visitor's room, securities and the Hostel Warden's quarter within the

campus.

Some other physical facilities are as follows:

1. Gardens, open green space with shady trees
2. Long protected boundary walls with 2 gates and security guards
3. Sufficient sanitation facilities with toilets and running water
4. Drinking water facilities with 2 nos. of coolers
5. Solar panels with 20 KV energy capacity
6. In campus Wi-Fi facility, 52 classrooms, 14 laboratories, 03 computer labs, 129 computers (106 for students 23 for staff/faculty), 09 LCD projectors and 40 CCTVs, 05 Smart Boards, printers (12), scanners (08), Xerox machines (04), a Studio for Mass Communication and necessary apparatus in the laboratories.
- 7.5 DG generators of 20, 35 and 40 KV capacities, sufficient numbers of fans, LED bulbs and computers.

Boys Hostel campus consists of a 50 seated AT hostel with adequate boundary walls, playground and a pond.

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4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1 Library is automated using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), subscription to e-resources, amount spent on purchase of books, journals and per day usage of library

Response:

The two library buildings each measuring 1634 sq. ft. and 2471 sq. ft. respectively has more than 56000

books covering all subjects including text books, reference books, books on general knowledge, 07 daily and 02 weekly newspapers (local and national), journals and other information sources like thesis, dissertations, hard bind and paper back volumes, maps, globes, CDs, photocopies, internet services of 200 mbps etc. The institution has subscription to N-List, where more than 97000 e-books and 6000 e-journals which are freely available for library users. There is a Xerox machine, 02 numbers of printers and 15 numbers of computers available for users to access and download e-books and e-journals.

Library automation is available in the following ways:

1. Computerisation – Computerisation has been introduced in the library towards the end of 2005 using the ILMs software - SOUL (Software for University Library) developed by INFLIBNET and the automation process of the library started phase wise. The automated circulation system was introduced in 2013 for better circulation system of library books for the benefit of the library users. In 2013 the SOUL college version package was upgraded to SOUL version 2.0. Catalogin and circulation is done in SOUL 2.0 and the rest of the house keeping is done manually. The library also provides OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue) facility for its users. The process of library automation is going on. As of now the library is only partially automated.
2. Barcode technology – To organise the disseminate flow of information in a systematic way the barcode technology was introduced in the circulation system in the year 2013. This method of automated identification and data collection has helped immensely in book keeping work.

To support the dissemination of information amongst the students in real time, we also have a well-equipped Public Address System for communicating important as well as emergent information to the students and the employees through in campus announcement. The system is equipped with 08 numbers of Dual Speaker, one Ahuja amplifier, one Microphone and one Ahuja Trolley.

5.4 Alumni Engagement

5.4.1 There is a registered Alumni Association that contributes significantly to the development of the institution through financial and/or other support services

Response:

The Alumni Association of the institution which was formed in 2004 is in the process of official registration. In the year 2018-2019, the Alumni Association donated the road running through the campus connecting the main gate of the institution with the back gate. The total cost of the road was estimated nearly rupees 8 lakhs. Normally, the Alumni Association takes interest in the activities of the institution and contributes significantly towards the development of the institution through financial and/or other support services. In the 2020-2021 academic session the Alumni Association's involvement is negligible

due to the Covid-19 Pandemics and the various SOPs issued by the government of Assam. As most of the time the institution had to remain close, the proposed plans and programs of the Association could not be materialized.

Criterion 6 - Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 The governance and leadership is in accordance with vision and mission of the institution and it is visible in various institutional practices such as decentralization and participation in the institutional governance

Response:

1. Vision:

- The vision of the college centers on its strong wish to become a center of excellence in the academic field of the entire North Eastern Region.
- It envisions being at par with the national standard in the field of education.

2. Mission:

- The college pursues a noble mission of spreading the light of knowledge as is evident from the Upanisadic hymn “Tamaso Ma Jyotirgamaya”.
- It wants the students to learn that it is not scientific progress alone, but the synthesis of both scientific progress and spiritual power of man that could open out vistas of human endeavor and achievement.

3. Governance and leadership:

The institution follows a democratic and participatory mode of governance involving all the stakeholders to participate actively in its administration. The institutional leadership ensures that the vision and the mission of the institution are given utmost importance in all matters related to governance. The apex body – the Governing Body – entrusts authority to the Principal, who share it with the different levels of functionaries in the institution. Under the able leadership of the Principal, the HODs of all the three streams, the office Superintendent Assistant and the Conveners/Joint Conveners of the various committees play a significant role in framing the institutional policies and implementing the same for better governance. The institution strives continuously to improve its performance and thereby contribute towards making it a centre of excellence.

4. Decentralization and participation in institutional governance:

The institution follows decentralization and participative management by involving its stake holders in various academic, administrative, construction and students’ election committees and by holding regular meetings for its proper functioning. The participation ranges from day to day affairs, development issues to future plans.

The participation of teachers, non teaching staff and guardian/parent representatives in decision making bodies reflects the process of decentralization and participation in the institutional governance. As the apex body it takes all the decisions related to administration, finance, construction, development and future

plans etc. Teaching and non-teaching members play a vital role in various decision making committees related to academics like admission, prospectus, examination; various administrative committees like library management, grievance redressal, anti-ragging, celebration of different festivals, conducting students' election, office management, canteen management etc. The following committees routine preparation committee, preparation of DKCSU Budget and maintenance of discipline have only teacher representatives. Participatory and decentralized governance is reflected in the inclusion of student members in various in house committees like Magazine Editorial Board, Student's Election Committees, Women's Forum, Internal Committee, RUSA and Festival Committee.

The process of decentralization practiced within the institution can be best understood from the functioning of the Internal Examination Committee (IEC) that is responsible for the smooth conduct of all the internal examinations of the institution. The IEC prepares the examination time table, collects question papers from the concerned departments, prints them in a press selected by the IEC, prepares the Invigilators Duty List (Teaching and Non Teaching staff), allots seating arrangement of the students subject wise and year/semester wise and distributes the answer scripts department wise for checking.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 The functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment and service rules, procedures, deployment of institutional Strategic/ perspective/development plan etc

Response:

The administrative setup is described in the Organogram (file attached).

The Governing Body (GB) is the apex body of the institution. The Principal, the second in hierarchy, carries out his duties after consulting the GB.

The Principal is assisted by an Academic In-charge. He/ She assist the Principal in academic and administrative spheres. To ensure regularity of classes in the Institution, the Academic in-charge submits the report of classes held, to the Principal regularly. He/ She have to oversee the class routine of the college, as a member of the Routine Committee.

The Head of the Departments (HOD) and the Librarian occupies another wing in the organogram. The faculty members working under the HOD of the concerned departments follows the directions of the respective HODs while discharging their duties. The HODs shoulders the responsibility of allotment of classes to the respective faculties. The functioning of the HOD and the faculty members is supervised by the Academic In-charge.

The IQAC Coordinator is a distinct part of the Organogram. The IQAC of the Institution has five core committee members besides the Chairperson (Principal) and Coordinator. This cell under the leadership of the Chairperson and the Coordinator takes stock of the quality initiatives taken by the institution. The Conveners and Joint Conveners of the 7 Criterion Committees under IQAC, carries out their responsibilities at the guidance of the IQAC Coordinator.

The Supporting Staff of the concerned Departments follows the directions of the HODs. Similarly, the Office staffs of the Library also carry out their duties at the guidance of the Librarian.

Next in the Organogram is the Principal's office headed by the Head Assistant and his supporting staff.

Besides, for smooth functioning of the institution, there are 15 committees and 6 cells/ forums along with the Students' Union and Alumni Association which are supervised by the Principal.

The committees and their functions are given as follows-

1. Centre Committee monitors the exam related activities within the campus.
2. Academic advisory committee advises the Principal regarding different academic activities in the College.
3. Admission Committee regulates the admission related activity of the College.
4. Prospectus Committee prepares the College prospectus.
5. Routine Committee prepares the daily class routine of the College.
6. Internal exam Committee conducts the tests and sessional exams.
7. Library Committee monitors the functioning of the library.
8. Disciplinary Committee is responsible for maintaining decorum within the campus.
9. Anti-ragging Committee ensures that the Campus is ragging free.
10. Festival Committee conducts the festivals.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 The institution has effective welfare measures and Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff

Response:

The College has a well-planned and effective welfare measures for both the teaching and non-teaching staff. Some of these measures are listed below:

- The institution follows all the Government norms and instructions as issued from time to time for the benefit of the employees such as Faculty Development Programme, Academic Leave, Medical Leave, Maternity Leave, Child Care Leave and other leaves.
- The institution has an active and well functioning welfare fund called Dakshin Kamrup Teachers' and Employees' Welfare Fund founded in 1986. The welfare measures undertaken from the fund for the benefit of the teaching and non-teaching staff include:

1. Financial aid to the members on retirement from service.
2. One time aid in cash to members suffering from long term illness or with high end expensive medical expenditures.
3. Financial aid to members suffering from sudden accidents causing long term medications.
4. Contribution to families of members if expired during service.

- The institute manages a Savings fund, Teachers and Employees Credit offers loan to employees at low interest rate and minimal loan repaying installment.
- The College has a Staff Common Room for both teaching and Non-teaching staff with comfortable seating arrangement, attached lavatory, daily newspapers and TV.
- The College has a hygienic and spacious canteen with separate seating arrangements for students, faculty members and staff. The canteen provides refreshments and meals at a rational price.
- The College has a health care centre with facilities such as blood pressure testing, first aid, pulse rate monitoring, weight and height measuring, wheel chair, medical bed along with a nurse to provide primary health care facilities.

Performance Appraisal System

The institution follows UGC regulations regarding the appraisal of Teaching staff and Assam Government for Non-Teaching staff in case of promotions. All the criterion under the different categories in the Academic Performance Indices are evaluated according to the UGC regulations by the IQAC and subsequently by the Departmental Promotion Committees constituted by the Subject Experts nominated by the Vice Chancellor of the affiliating University, Head of the concerned Department and the Principal in case of Teaching staff. For the Non-Teaching staff, the regulations issued by the State Government are followed. The Service Books of the faculty members are updated from time to time.

However, there is a provision of issuing the Performance Appraisal System Report to the Teaching/Non-Teaching staff if and when necessary.

Besides, the Teaching staff is appraised by the Principal and the President of the Governing Body as per the format in the Self Appraisal Report under the Assam Government Employees Rules. The criteria assessed include:

The institute has an appropriate framework for effective utilization and mobilization of funds received from different sources (RUSA, DST, DBT, Assam State Government, UGC, etc.). Some of the key features are highlighted below:

- The College has a mechanism for welcoming donations from alumni, memorial prizes and endowments from the stakeholders.

- The College has policies to mobilize funds received for making a sustainable campus with emphasis on green technology.
- The college has mechanisms by which it reaches out to banks, corporate houses and several prominent personalities in the region for generous patronage.
- The College houses various internal committees for strategizing funds allocation to different departments and centres.
- Different purchase committees under the aegis of the Principal floats tenders from time to time to optimally utilize funds for purchasing equipment's necessary for the College.
- Timely audit of the institution is carried out on a regular basis by an approved Chartered Accountant for transparency.

For space mobilization and utilization, the measures taken by the College are

- The College houses a vermi compost facility to utilize some of the unused space within the campus.
- The College has installed the solar photo-voltaic grid by utilizing the roof top of the Science building.
- College premises are utilized for organizing various state and national level competitive exams time to time.
- College hosts skill development courses like electrician certificate course for the benefit of the locals.
- A study centre for Krishna Kanta Handiqui state Open University and Rastriya Sanskrit Sansthan housed in the College campus act as a part of the academic extension activity of the College.
- The College encourages and organizes collaborative activities such as blood and organ donation camp, tobacco prevention, etc., as a part of its social outreach activities.
- During pandemic, the College campus has been utilized as a COVID testing facility.
- The College indoor stadium provides facility for the local youth from time to time to train for various state and national level tournaments. The indoor stadium also hosts various Yoga training programs and women forum activities from time to time.
- The K K Handiqui conference hall of the college frequently hosts various programs/conferences/seminars at the request of different governmental/non-governmental bodies that serves to support capacity building/entrepreneurship development of the faculty and students.
- The College also provides room for 3 ATM's near the main gate for facilitating the campus users and the general public.
- The College Auditorium hosts cultural programs at the directive of the state government and at the request of various NGO's.
- The College playground is used by various schools to host their annual sports events.

For intellectual mobilization and utilization, the measures taken by the College are

- The College encourages its faculty members to act as resource persons in different academic and socially relevant programs.
- The College faculty members serve as external examiners/supervising officers to support and conduct various examinations organised by schools/ colleges/ universities/government bodies.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

It reviews teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and records the incremental improvement in various activities

Response:

The IQAC has immensely contributed in the implementation of quality assurance strategies and process at all levels. Some of the initiatives taken by IQAC are listed below:

- IQAC has introduced mentoring classes using online and offline platforms, where focus is laid on solving student problems at the academic and personal levels. These classes serve as counseling classes for students and aims at achieving academic and emotional well-being. Additionally, IQAC has resolved to annually conduct orientation programme for UG students to educate them about the use of college resources, library, availing scholarship facilities and higher education facilities for career advancement.
- IQAC regularly organize faculty development programs (FDPs) for its faculty members to help faculty members gain an in-depth understanding of the teaching learning process.
- IQAC encourages the students and faculty members to develop entrepreneurship capabilities by organizing seminars/workshops that train people on developing such capacities.
- IQAC frequently organizes talk by eminent researchers to train its faculty members on the recent developments in research and the methodologies involved. IQAC also takes initiative to train its faculty members and students for maximizing the use of online resources for research.
- To facilitate participation of more students/faculty members and enabling hosting of programs for longer duration, IQAC had a subscription based Zoom account that was made available to the event organizers.
- IQAC ensures the creation of an integrated academic calendar (at the beginning of the academic year) following the guidelines of Gauhati University for the smooth functioning of academic activities.
- IQAC encourages the respective departments to regularly organize Parents-Teachers Meet as a part of the teaching learning process.
- Under the aegis of IQAC, the institute has a Micro Research Cell that encourages faculty members to carry out minor research projects, the funding for which is provided by the cell.
- IQAC has taken the initiative to train the faculty members for the National Education Policy 2020 by organizing lectures by eminent experts from different University.
- IQAC constantly encourages maximizing the use of ICT tools in classes and laboratories for making classes more interactive and to educate the students and faculty members, it organizes timely lectures and talks regarding the benefits of ICT tools in learning. IQAC has also taken initiatives for developing ICT enabled classrooms and laboratories in the College campus. Furthermore, the initiative for developing a Language lab has also been undertaken.

- IQAC encourages different departments to introduce more area specific job oriented courses. As an outcome, Electrician Certificate course by Physics, Department of Vocational studies, and Centre for Media Studies was introduced in the College campus.
- IQAC organizes yoga training campus for the students and faculty members to augment the teaching learning process as a healthy mind and body is essential for holistic development.
- IQAC has taken initiative to organize events such as Beti Bachao Beti Padhao, Creating COVID awareness, suicide prevention, tobacco awareness and the essence of positive thinking during the pandemic. These events serve as a measure to introduce the students to various societal issues and how to solve them.

Response:

The institution focuses on providing an inclusive environment. Tolerance and harmony towards cultural, regional and linguistic diversity is reflected in the following programs conducted by the institution.

1. Cultural rally exhibiting the rich tradition of Assam along with the culture of North East India during Annual College Week.

2. Competition of folk songs, dances, dresses, drama etc. However, during the year 2020-21, the college had to abandon the large scale celebrations of such programs due to Covid situation. Only a special college week of three days duration was held from 8th April to 10th April, 2021 with some limited programs.

3. Linguistic harmony amongst the students belonging to various ethnic communities like Bodo, Rabha, Garo is maintained by using Assamese language as the lingua franca. The Bengali and Marwari community also use Assamese and Hindi as lingua franca. The institution always provides a congenial atmosphere where students from different communities can together take part in various college functions, festivals and activities.

4. The college observes the diverse socio-economic condition of the people of the nearby villages. In order to improve the socio-economic condition of the villagers, our college has adopted few villages like Ganesh para, Sontala, Gargara etc. From time to time, the teaching and non-teaching staffs along with the students conduct different activities in these villages, so that the villagers can maintain a healthy, harmonious relation among themselves as well as with the college.

The Department of Economics of our college has conducted a socio-economic survey on Pottery Industries in Rajapukhuri area on 2nd November 2018. They also carried out awareness programme at Ganesh para on 17th February, 2021 and at Sontala village on 1st March, 2021 to sensitize the villagers to understand the importance of small savings. They tried to make them aware that through small savings the economic condition of people can be improved to a great extent.

Title: Office Automation

Context:

Office automation refers to a process that uses different types of computer systems and software to collect, store, and transfer and alter office information. Office automation helps to carry out the office works easily and perfectly avoiding existing cumbersome manual procedure that wastes money and time.

Practice:

The partial office automation helps in on-line form fill up for students' admission, scholarships, examination, registration etc. besides financial transactions like disbursements of employees' salary, students' scholarship, purchase of different essential items for the college etc. Moreover, communications with higher authorities i.e. Director of Higher Education, Education Secretary are made through this automation process. The process of office automation is very much significant in the context of Indian higher education as it helps in smooth functioning of the institution. The College also has a functional E-Governance policy for smooth governance of the activities.

Evidence of success:

Office automation has been successfully implemented in the following areas-

- a) On-line Students' Admission in Bachelor and Post-graduate courses (2020 – 21, 2021-22)
- b) Processing of students scholarships for the year 2020 – 2021
- c) On-line application for Registration of 1st Semester Students in Gauhati University.

Problem encountered and resource required:

The initial phase of College Automation was difficult as the employees had to be well trained in ways of using the automation services.

A continuous funding is required for maintenance of the resources which has to be spent from the General Fund of the College.

Response:

Introduction:

The institution “Dakshin Kamrup College” is located in semi-urban area and has a confluence of both the rural and urban cultures brought in by students from different regions with different cultures. As the vision of the college is to become the Centre of excellence, the college imparts quality education to its students preparing them to face the challenges of time and motivating them to respect dignity of labor. So it aims to develop moral and spiritual values amongst the students to become responsible citizens. Additionally, the College is committed towards diverse perspectives on higher education of the entire South Kamrup region. As a part of this initiative, the College works with nearby schools and various non-government agencies for the overall development of the region: education, financial and social well-being.

The thrust area is to focus on 21st century skills and to create an environment for the students to face the upcoming challenges and globalisation and hence the institution gives importance on rational and critical thinking.

Methodology:

The College has a long term objective of attracting the best minds of this region. To accomplish the objective, the College has introduced outreach programs in the grassroots level. The College is involved in organising programs in different schools, which is aimed at developing the inquisitiveness of the students from a very early age. Once these students graduate, they are automatically drawn to the College, where they are rigorously trained and counselled to achieve academic excellence. To inspire these students, the College has a policy of felicitating the students through different award schemes. The detailed mechanism of the process is elaborated below.

Practice:

As a part of the Outreach activities, the College has taken special initiative towards mentoring students of the region, which can contribute immensely towards development of their scientific temperament. This forms a part of the outreach activity of the College, in which faculty members from different Science Departments are engaged in demonstrating science experiments by visiting schools situated in the South Kamrup region from time to time. **Due to the new state Government policy of providing “free admissions” since 2021, the number of the students applying for such “aid” has decreased.*

Counseling these students and providing proper guidance has in turn contributed in bringing laurels to the College by cracking various National and State level examinations such as JAM, UGC NET, UGC CSIR NET, SLET, and CTET etc. Many of these students have gone to pursue higher education in institutes of national importance such as IITs, NITs and other institutes of national repute thereby contributing towards nation building. The College has witnessed a substantial increase in the percentage of such successful students over time since the inception of the outreach activities. Over time these successful students have maintained good relations with the College and have acknowledged the contribution of the College in their lives.

In addition to these practices, the College has from time to time have come up with programs to enable the youth of South Kamrup region to become financially independent through programs like “Mushroom Cultivation”, professional certificate courses like “8 months Electrician Course” and Vocational Course like “Banking and Financial Services”, “Retail Management and Information Technology”. The introduction of this program has led to generation of secondary income sources for various families of the region. This has enabled them to send their wards to Schools and Colleges, enabling the College to fulfill one of its major objectives of enhancing the literacy rate in the region.

However, the onset of the Pandemic has hampered in carrying out the outreach activities of the college and thereby contributing in the upliftment the educational, financial and social well-being of the region. The introduction of the CBCS course has compelled the faculty members to dedicate their major time in teaching-learning-evaluation process. Despite the hurdles the college has carried out programs in small scale to fulfil its commitment and decided to form an Extension and Outreach Activity Club to carry out such activities for the wellbeing of the region.
